


Summer Grant Celebration

2011 Grantees

In 2011, Act of Giving members voted to award \$18,000 in grants to three impressive organizations. An additional \$2,400 was awarded at the Summer Grant Celebration.

Pat Graney Company, \$8,000

The Pat Graney Company is a non-profit dance troupe that teaches dance, expository writing, visual art and performance to women in Washington State prisons. The grant provided seed funding to develop Transitions, a new program that envisioned developing community mentors to help women make a sustained successful transition to their communities after serving their sentences. With the grant funds, the Company recruited its first wave of community volunteers, conducted mentorship training, and presented the program to several prisons. They are now adapting a community mentorship manual to incorporate the arts in post-release community integration, continuing mentor training with an orientation session at a Seattle work release program, and developing relationships with additional women's corrections centers.

Sightlife, \$5,000

Founded in 1969, SightLife is the only non-profit global health organization and eye bank solely focused on eliminating corneal blindness in the U.S. and around the world. Driven by an entrepreneurial spirit as an eye bank, the organization leverages innovative technologies and best business practices to transform lives and unlock life's possibilities for the corneal blind. SightLife works in partnership with surgeons and health organizations in more than 30 countries and SightLife and its partners combined provided more than 10,000 corneas for transplant in 2011.

EX3 Teen Center, \$5,000

EX3 is part of the Boys & Girls Clubs of King County, which is devoted entirely to teens grades 6 through 12 who have been identified as having risk factors for dropping out of school. The grant from Act of Giving funded a valuable one-on-one mentoring program for participating students that builds a trusting relationship as well as tracking attendance, behavior, grades and social competencies. The grant also supported student transportation costs to and from the program.

Summer Grant Slam, \$2,400

On a beautiful August 2011 summer night in Seattle, a group of non-profit loving individuals joined together to celebrate the three Act of Giving grants for 2011. In addition, the first ever "Grant Slam" was held and made for an exciting night with a surprising outcome.

After numerous past grantees gave their 60 second elevator pitch (some in the form of song, others in limerick, and all very touching) the attendees had the opportunity to vote for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place. Just before voting occurred two anonymous donors made it possible to give another \$400 grant which offered a 4th slot on the ballot. And the grants went to....
